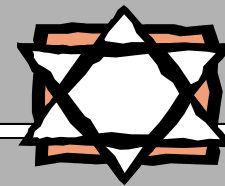

FROM THE RABBI



RABBI MINNA BROMBERG

The High Holy Days are behind us for 5772, but I wanted to take this space to reflect on one of my favorite things about being with you for Rosh HaShana and Yom Kippur. I love meeting people who grew up at Keshar Zion and have now “flown the nest” to many different corners of the world -- the alumni of Keshar Zion.

We sometimes lament the fact that many people who grow up at Keshar Zion move on to larger cities or larger Jewish communities. We look at the empty seats in our sanctuary and wonder where they have all gone. Sometimes, certainly, we see in those empty seats the many friends and family members who have died. Those losses are real.

But when I actually get to meet people who grew up at Keshar Zion and now have children and grandchildren (and sometimes great-grandchildren!) of their own, I see a different picture. I get a sense of KZ as an incubator: teaching and nurturing people at critical stages in their lives and sending them out into the world. I get to hear about the rabbis and cantors and educators in whose footsteps I am now walking. I get to hear about softball games and Hebrew School high jinx. I get to hear about friendships lasting across the generations and people who met their spouses right here in the Keshar Zion sanctuary. And most important, I get to hear about the values that growing up at Keshar Zion have instilled in our alumni -- Jewish values that they carry with them no matter where they live.

So far, I have met our far-flung alumni primarily at the High Holy Days or at family life cycle events. And this would all be simple nostalgia but for one thing: I believe we can still connect with our alumni both near and far. And I believe that, living in the digital age as we do, such connections have never been easier to make and to foster. So, even though most of you are reading this printed on paper and mailed to you via “snail mail,” I will also be posting it on Keshar Zion’s Facebook page. Yes, we do have a Keshar Zion Facebook page!

Together, we can turn the fact that our alumni have spread out all over the place into an asset: imagine what all those folks may have learned in their new Jewish communities that we might want to know. Imagine the new perspectives and new stories that they might share with us if we can make a connection with them. We can share what Keshar Zion still has to offer and we can certainly benefit from hearing from and staying connected with our alumni.

A MITZVAH IS A BEAUTIFUL THING

This year's TORAH FUND theme is "Hiddur Mitzvah". This is the concept of embellishing a mitzvah through aesthetics. With enhancement and adornment, the mitzvot appeal to the senses and the heart, and sacred objects and activities become even more precious. Saying Kiddush over holiday wine is a beautiful act: a magnificent silver cup refines and perfects the experience. Ark covers and Torah mantles have been embellished with needlework in Italy and Prague in the 17th century and at Keshar Zion in the 20th century. These touches of adornment are just a little something extra to add meaning to the rituals and our daily life.

The pomegranate imagery of this year's TORAH FUND pin has multilayered meaning. In addition to being beautiful, pomegranates are one of the bountiful fruits of Israel. The Hebrew word for pomegranates is "Rimmonim" and this word is the term used for the silver adornments on the wooden rollers of the Torah scrolls.

May the coming year of Sisterhood and TORAH FUND be a blessing, both beautiful and practical, to one and all.

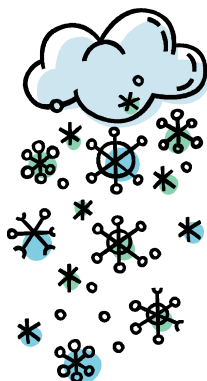

The Inaugural Dr. Robert N. Greenberg Scholar-in-Residence Program December 2nd & 3rd

The inaugural Dr. Robert N. Greenberg Scholar-in-Residence Program will take place December second and third. We are pleased to welcome Dr. Saul P. Wachs as our esteemed scholar for the weekend. Dr. Wachs' presentations will be based on the theme of "Prayer and Modernity".

Dr. Wachs is the Rosaline B. Feinstein Professor of Education and Liturgy, Director of the Doctoral Program in Jewish Education and Chair of the Education Department of Gratz College.

A native of Philadelphia, Dr. Wachs holds undergraduate and graduate degrees in education, Jewish education and Jewish music from Gratz College, Temple University, the Jewish Theological Seminary and Ohio State University. He has also pursued graduate work at Bank Street College, Teachers College, Columbia University and the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. In 1989, the Jewish Theological Seminary awarded Dr. Wachs the degree of Doctor of Pedagogy, Honoris Causa.

Dr. Wachs has taught or lectured at The Academy of Jewish Religion, American University, American Jewish University, Baltimore Hebrew University, Bar Ilan University, Florida International University, George Washington University, Hebrew College, Hebrew Union College, Hebrew University of Jerusalem, Jewish Theological Seminary, LaSalle University, McAlester College, Reconstructionist Rabbinical College, Schechter Institute for Jewish Studies, Tel Aviv University, University of Pennsylvania and Villanova University.

Author of over seventy publications, Dr. Wachs is a highly sought after lecturer who has presented to almost 400 communities on five continents and now we are so pleased to be able to welcome him to Keshar Zion on December 2nd and 3rd.

The overall theme of our learning with Dr. Wachs will be "Prayer and Modernity". Dr. Wachs will teach on the following topics:

"The Dignity of Words" (Friday evening), "Discovering the Shema" (Shabbat morning), and "Healing the Self" (Saturday evening).

LAWS OF CHANUKAH



1. The candles in your Menorah should be placed in a straight row, since no day of Chanukah is superior to another. Only the Shammos, the kindler and guardian of the lights, the 9th candle, should stand higher than the others.
2. The Chanukah lights should be kindled immediately after Maariv (evening service). However, if that is not possible, they may be kindled at any time during the night.
3. This is the proper way to light the candles: On the first night place one candle in the Menorah at the extreme right. On the other seven nights: Place the candles in the Menorah from right to left, adding one each night. Light the Shammos. With it light the candle on the left first, so that on each night the new candle is given a special welcome by being lit first.
 In short: Place – right to left
 Light – left to right
4. Before lighting the Chanukah candles each night, two Brachot are recited. The first Bracha refers to the commandment to light the candles and the second to the miracles which happened in connection with the first Chanukah. In addition to these two, a third Bracha “Shehecheyanu” is said on the first night, in which we thank God that we have lived to celebrate this holiday. These benedictions can be found in any complete siddur. After the candles are lit, it is the popular custom to sing or recite Haneros Halalu and Maoz Tzur, and after that other Chanukah songs that you know and which can be found in the siddur.
5. The lights should be lit before anyone, child or adult, goes to sleep and should burn for at least half an hour. The Menorah should be placed in the window for public view if possible.
6. Men, women and children may kindle the Menorah. It is a good custom to have a separate lamp for each member of the family, so that each person may light his own. This is particularly recommended for the children.
7. On Friday night the Chanukah lights are lit before the Sabbath candles. At the conclusion of the Sabbath, the Chanukah lamp is lit after Havdalah.
8. Decorate your home and rejoice on Chanukah, taking time to sing songs, exchange gifts, and tell the stories of this Jewish festival.

HOW TO LIGHT CHANUKAH CANDLES

Inasmuch as the ceremony of the kindling of the lights is the most significant phase of Chanukah, it should be observed in the spirit of reverence and solemnity.

The lights should be kindled as soon after nightfall as possible.

However, every effort should be made to see to it that all members of the family are present at the ceremony of the lighting of the candles. Not only the men, but women and children as well may kindle the Chanukah light.

Light the “shamash” candle first. This is then used to light the other candles. On the first evening of Chanukah, one candle is kindled. It is placed on the far right as you face the menorah. On the second night and on each succeeding night, the candle for that particular evening, which is to the left, is lighted first.

On Friday, the Chanukah candles are kindled before the lighting of the Sabbath candles, and on Saturday night, the Chanukah candles are kindled after “Havdalah”, which marks the conclusion of the Sabbath.

This year Chanukah starts on Tuesday evening, December 20, 2011. The Shamash candle is to be used each night to light the Chanukah candles.

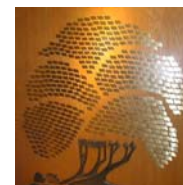

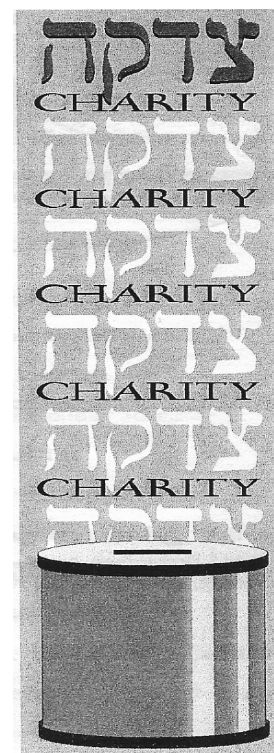
