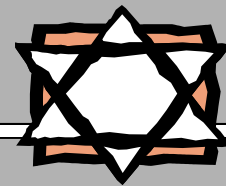

HIGH HOLIDAY PARKING

Through the cooperation of the Reading Police Department, street parking during services on Yom Kippur, Friday, October 7, 2011 (5:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.) & Saturday, October 8, 2011 (9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.) will be permitted on the north side of the 1200 block of Hill Road (in addition to the south side), and on Constitution Blvd. (if necessary), locations where parking is normally prohibited. An officer will be provided to assist with parking. Tickets, however will be issued if cars are parked in areas obstructing traffic flow and when complaints from public are received.

FROM THE RABBI



RABBI MINNA BROMBERG

When I went to Home Depot last year to buy the building materials for my very first sukkah, the employee who helped me was a bit concerned when I showed him the list of lumber I would need. What could I possibly be building that required such a high proportion of flimsy two-by-twos? He seemed concerned for my safety. I began explaining that this was for a ritual hut that only needed to stand for seven days, but the more I explained, the more his concern seemed to turn from fearing for my safety to fearing for my sanity. As soon as I said, "It's an outdoor hut that's used for a Jewish holiday," he put up his hand and said, "I don't want to know." He was more than helpful with my lumber needs but clearly thought that whatever I did in my own backyard should be my business alone.

So, what is this strange construction we build? Three or more walls that can be made of fabric, a clear overhead with no trees overhanging, a see-through roof, and the whole thing is supposed to let the rain and wind in instead of keeping them out?

A sukkah is a liminal space. Coming from the Latin word for "threshold," a liminal space is an in-between place; it sits on a border. A sukkah sits on the border between indoors and out of doors, between solid and flimsy, between fixed and movable. We sit between seasons: in Israel the dry season is ending but the rains have usually not yet come. Here in North America we sit between summer and fall: will we want blankets in our sukkah this year or wish we had a fan? You wouldn't want a house like this, but for a sukkah it's just fine; all of this in-betweenness is by design. For example, we are told in Talmud that the *s'chach* --the once-living branches and stalks that cover the roof of the sukkah-- should provide more shade than sun but still leave enough space to see the stars: not opaque, but not entirely see-through.

The ultimate liminality, the ultimate border, is the border between life and death. On Yom Kippur, we rehearsed our own deaths: dressing in the white of the shroud, refraining from the natural things that living beings do like eating and drinking and having sexual relations. The sukkah is an invitation, inviting us back to life from the near death experience of Yom Kippur. The liminality of the sukkah lets us transition from the Days of Awe back to our everyday lives. And yet the sukkah does this without falsely promising that life will now be a permanent place of ease and security. Instead, a sukkah allows us a space to sit, to dwell in uncertainty and impermanence; the wind blows through, the rain drips in, and the stars shine down. And in this very in-between space, we come back to life: eating and drinking, visiting with loved ones, even singing and celebrating.

The arrival of the dues bill shouldn't prompt a thought process or discussion on whether membership should be continued. Please think of your membership as a commitment that is perpetual, like a circle. With the arrival of Simchat Torah we celebrate by carrying all of our Torahs in a processional around the sanctuary and rejoice with high spirited singing. I look forward to celebrating Simchat Torah with you.

Although my comments this month were brief, I would be remiss in closing without saying a few words about Bob Greenberg. Bob was active in many capacities at Keshet Zion including serving as President of the Board of Directors from 2006-2008 and Secretary in 2011. No task was ever too large or small for Bob to undertake and his service on the Board of Directors was something he took very seriously. He was one of the most well respected individuals that I knew. From the day that Bob recruited me to serve on the Board, he served as a mentor for me and was always available when I needed him. He was a friend. Bob never had a bad word to say about anyone. If he did, he certainly took it with him and left us with only wonderful memories of his gentle and kind way. Bob was a leader who inspired others. A significant loss to our entire community, we will miss Bob. Our deepest condolences go out to Carol, the entire Greenberg family and all who mourn his loss.

A MITZVAH IS A BEAUTIFUL THING

This year's TORAH FUND theme is "Hiddur Mitzvah". This is the concept of embellishing a mitzvah through aesthetics. With enhancement and adornment, the mitzvot appeal to the senses and the heart, and sacred objects and activities become even more precious. Saying Kiddush over holiday wine is a beautiful act: a magnificent silver cup refines and perfects the experience. Ark covers and Torah mantles have been embellished with needlework in Italy and Prague in the 17th century and at Keshar Zion in the 20th century. These touches of adornment are just a little something extra to add meaning to the rituals and our daily life.

The pomegranate imagery of this year's TORAH FUND pin has multilayered meaning. In addition to being beautiful, pomegranates are one of the bountiful fruits of Israel. The Hebrew word for pomegranates is "Rimmonim" and this word is the term used for the silver adornments on the wooden rollers of the Torah scrolls.

May the coming year of Sisterhood and TORAH FUND be a blessing, both beautiful and practical, to one and all.

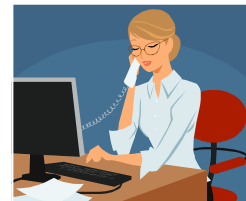
