Who Is Counting Now?

Starting on the second day of Passover, our Festival of Freedom, we counted 50 days. Sheva Shavuot, 7 weeks, brought us to the Feast of Weeks. On the 50th day we observed the Festival of Shavuot, when we celebrated matan Torateinu/the giving of Torah at Mt. Sinai. Now what? Now, the cycle of reading Torah has brought us to the book of Numbers. The Hebrew name for this, the 4th of the 5 Books of Moses, is B'midbar/in the wilderness. No, the Israelites were not wandering in the wilderness; they followed God's guidance. (By the way, the term "wandering Jew" is actually an insulting appellation first developed in the 13th century.) Yes, God did direct the Israelites to move several times (42 stops in total between leaving Egypt and entering Canaan). But they spent 38 of the 40 years around Kadesh Barnea. The Israelites were encamped at Mt. Sinai for about 1 year.



What were they doing all this time? They were learning-what it meant to be free from slavery and a nation. A nation in covenant with the Creator of everything – taught how to live a holy life. Holiness is not performing rituals, but living in ways that sanctify God. "Be holy, for I am holy," is an oft-repeated instruction. The attributes of the Divine that we can emulate are compassion, justice, mercy, and faithfulness. Moses did not learn all of Torah in 40 days atop Mt. Sinai, he continued to learn during the 40 years as we have received the Written Torah. Our sages continued to learn as embodied in the record of the Oral Torah. We did not learn everything at the age of Bar or Bat Mitzvah, at 12 or 13, or at graduation from one level of schooling or another. We are charge to engage in lifelong learning and continued, daily/tamid, efforts to observe the performative and prohibitive mitzvot.

"You must love animals, are you a vet?", he asked? "Vet and cold!"






Moshe was talking to his psychiatrist.
