Hodu Ladoshem Ki Tov

As a boy, my father had the task of banking the coals each night to maintain the fire and ward off the cold for the sake of all who lived in that building. As a Boy Scout, when winter camping, fire watch through the night was a task I shared, in cooperation and in shifts, with other Scouts for the protection and benefit of the entire troop. For centuries, living in polities ruled by non-Jews, Jews were denied many rights - including citizenship and the enfranchisement to vote. This month, on Tuesday, November 4th, we have the privilege and the responsibility to vote. Democracy, like fire, is powerful but needs tending.

Winston Churchill said, "Democracy is the worst form of government except for all those other forms that have been tried from time to time." He was speaking, in 1947, after wardens of democracy, the citizens of Germany, had failed to protect and defend themselves from authoritarian rule. Democratically elected, Hitler subsequently freed himself of legal restrictions by declaring himself *Führer* und *Reichskanzler* ("Leader and Reich Chancellor"). As unchecked supreme leader, he dismantled the republican government and enacted hundreds of laws disenfranchising and attacking Jews, and other "enemies of the state."

On the night of November 9, 1938, Germany's now one-party ruled government orchestrated a night of broken glass, Kristallnacht -the widespread attack against Jewish buildings and Jewish individuals. The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum reports that the Nazis burned more than 1,400 synagogues, vandalized thousands of Jewish-owned businesses, broke into Jewish homes, humiliated, assaulted, and killed Jewish people, and imprisoned in concentration camps about 26,000 Jewish men. This year, on Sunday, November 9, not just Jews, but other good-hearted members of our greater Reading community will gather together to remember and recognize the crimes committed, the dangers that preceded them, and the world-changing consequences that followed. You are encouraged to be part of that event (to be held at Trinity Lutheran Church at 7 PM).

Two days later, one week after Election Day, we will observe Veterans Day. November 11 – the 11th day of the 11th month, the day the Great War ended – now, after a second World War, recognizes and honors all who served our country in wartime. Jews have served in America's military in numbers disproportionately larger than our percentage of the population. We remember and honor all who have served. From Jewish Military Chaplain Michael Bloom, we may pray:

Give thanks to the Eternal, for God is good, His mercy endures forever.

Avinu Shebashamayim - O Sovereign of the universe, bless our nation, the <u>United States of</u> America.

Safeguard it and its ideals of freedom and liberty.

Bless our Veterans, our Defenders of Liberty, who braved danger to defend us from tyranny.

Giving thanks is something to do every day. This year, Kesher Zion embraced something – I don't believe we have seen in our synagogue's history before – Co-presidents. Our partnership reflects the spirit of collaboration and teamwork that is at the very heart of Kesher Zion. We understand that leadership isn't about one person, but about a shared vision, mutual respect, and the strength that comes from working together toward a common goal.

The High Holidays mark a sacred time in our lives—one of deep introspection, prayer, and, most importantly, community. In this moment, we look inward and upward, seeking forgiveness, growth, and a fresh start. But we also look outward toward each other. Because we know that the strength of this community, Kesher Zion, is built on the bonds we share.

The Torah portion today, Leviticus 16:1-34, recounts the ritual acts done by Aaron (and, presumably, subsequent high priests) on this Day of Atonement. The passage is rich in detail, describing exactly what Aaron must do to atone for the sins of Israel, all the items that must be handled: goats, bulls, rams, lots, censors, coals, fire, incense, curtains, covers, the ark, water, the instruments of slaughter...

Only Aaron's actions are described, but each one of his acts would have required dozens and dozens of people behind the scenes, each ritual item used represents enormous amounts of labor. First, Aaron brings a bull and a ram into the sanctuary (verse 3): who bred the parents, birthed the calves, fed and watered and cared for them as they grew? Next Aaron is to put on his vestments-who grew and harvested the flax, who hung it out to dry, who carded the fibers, who spun the threads, who wove them into clothe, who constructed the tunic, the undergarments, the sash, and the turban? Who drew the water he used to bathe? And now we are through verse 4. I could go on.

At Kesher Zion, we know that no one stands alone. It is in our shared efforts, our collective prayers, and our mutual support that we truly thrive. This is a time to remember that every act of kindness, every moment of connection, and every prayer uttered together strengthens the fabric of our community.

Whether it's our volunteers who spend countless hours making sure our services run smoothly, that our website is continually upgraded – and if you haven't looked at it lately, please do. There are wonderful resources that are now accessible to everyone – the overseeing of our finances, our social action committee – or our board of directors, making decisions for the synagogue's future—every act of service has been driven by the spirit of collaboration. We've come together to serve one another, and through this work, we've made Kesher Zion more than just a place of worship; we've made it our home.

But the work is not done.

We are entering a year filled with opportunity, and the strength of our congregation—our success in fostering spiritual growth, education, and community—is rooted in your commitment and generosity. As we prepare for the year ahead, I ask you to reflect on what Kesher Zion means to you. Maybe it is the sense of security you feel when you walk through our doors. Perhaps it's the connection to a rich tradition that continues to shape our lives. Or maybe it's the feeling of knowing you are part of something larger, something that thrives because we all contribute our unique gifts.

It is this spirit of teamwork that will continue to propel us forward.

To continue providing the vibrant and nurturing environment that we all cherish, we need each and every one of you. Whether you can contribute your time, your talents, or your resources, we are counting on the collective strength of this congregation. Your support ensures that we will sustain and we will grow. Together, we can rise to the challenges ahead. Together, we can make sure that our community not only survives but thrives. The work we do together today will echo through the lives of our children, our families, and generations to come. This is the strength of our synagogue.

We are deeply grateful for each of you—for your presence, your passion, and your commitment to Kesher Zion. It was Hanukkah and the tiny village was in fear of not having any latkes becausethey had run out of flour.


